1859 Lost daguerreotype, by an unknown cameraman, Columbus, Ohio, *Friday*, September 16, 1859.

The Columbus *Statesman*, a paper which opposed Lincoln's political views, reported: "We think Mr. Lincoln will never be invited here again, and that was perhaps his opinion, as he had his daguerreotype taken in the forenoon, with a view of leaving it, we suppose, as a remembrancer for his Columbus friends. It ought to be hung in the Young Men's Republican Club room."

Destroyed daguerreotype by Thomas Walker Cridland, Dayton, Ohio, Saturday, September 17, 1859.

The grandson of photographer Cridland, Walter D. McKinney, wrote: "My grandfather was introduced to Mr. Lincoln by Samuel Craighead... and Lincoln accompanied Mr. Cridland to the photographic gallery, where photographs were made... the negative, or negatives, were destroyed by a fire about 1865 in the attic of the gallery...."I well remember the destruction of the original negative as told over and over again."
